CORONAVIRUS DISEASE (COVID-19) ADVISORY

Due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, Contra Costa County and Governor Gavin Newsom have issued multiple orders requiring sheltering in place, social distancing, and reduction of person-to-person contact. (See, for example, March 31, 2020 County Order extending the shelter-in-place order until May 3, 2020 & March 19, 2020 statewide shelter-in-place order.) The public, for example, may not shout or use amplifying devices, must submit comment cards and speak during their allotted time in order to provide public comment, may not create a physical disturbance, may not speak on matters unrelated to issues within the jurisdiction of the Oversight Board or the agenda item at hand, and may not cause immediate threats to public safety.

SUBJECT: RFP UPDATE AND FINALIZATION OF REVIEW PROCESS

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

LISTEN to a status update on the outcome of the Request for Proposals (RFP) process for the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 grant cycle, and DISCUSS the RFP Review Process

FINANCIAL IMPACT OF RECOMMENDATION:

There is no financial impact to receiving this report. The City is required to set aside a portion of the annual unrestricted general purpose revenues for transfer to the Richmond Fund for Children and Youth. An estimated \$1.8 million in total available grant funding is projected during FY 2022-2023, however, 10 percent is allocated to support administrative functions which include staff cost, overhead, etc. Consequently, for FY 2022-2023 the total amount available for grant awards will be approximately \$1.62 million or 90 percent of the \$1.8 million. The available funds for grants in years two and three will increase based on the funding allocations outlined in Article 15, Section 2 of the Richmond Charter.

DISCUSSION:

Per the Charter, the 2021-2024 Request for Proposals (RFP) aims to solicit program proposals from non-profit organizations and public agencies to provide services to children and youth in Richmond and North Richmond. On a Special Meeting held on December 6, 2021, the RFP was approved and subsequently released on December 27, 2021, in accordance with the charter requirements.

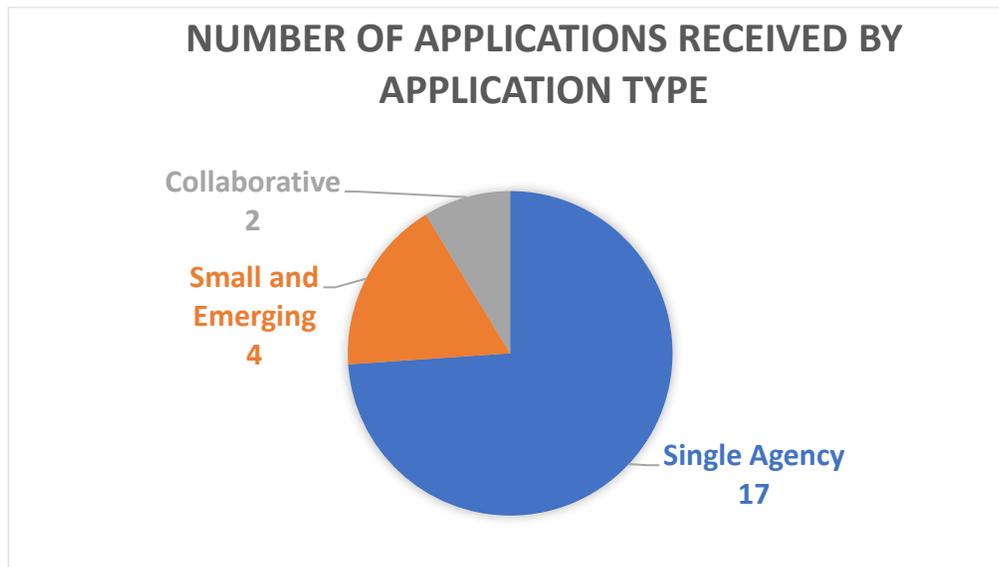
Following release of the RFP, Richmond Department of Children and Youth (RDCY) staff posted the proposal on its website, the City's BidsOnline portal (an online portal that allows vendors to bid on various city projects), and shared the announcement utilizing its social media platforms and listservs. RDCY staff also constructed a webpage for easy access to RFP-related documents and set up an online proposal submission portal.

On January 10 and 11, the department hosted more than 50 individuals for the information (pre-bidders) sessions. Following the meeting, a recording of the session and slide deck information was posted to the department’s webpage as a reference. RDCY fielded technical questions from potential applicants from January 11, 2022, through February 7, 2022. Finally, on Monday, February 7, 2022, at 2:00 pm, applications were due, Department staff closed the online submittal portal, and began downloading and compiling applications.

Proposals Received for FY 2022-23 Funding Cycle

RDCY received 23 application submissions at the end of the grant deadline and of those 23 grant applications, 4 organizations or 17 percent identified as Small and Emerging (annual budget less than \$250,000), 17 organizations or 74 percent identified as Single Agency (annual budgets over \$250,000), and 2 applicants or 9 percent identified as Collaboratives (two or more organizations).

Figure 1. Number of Applications Received by Application Type



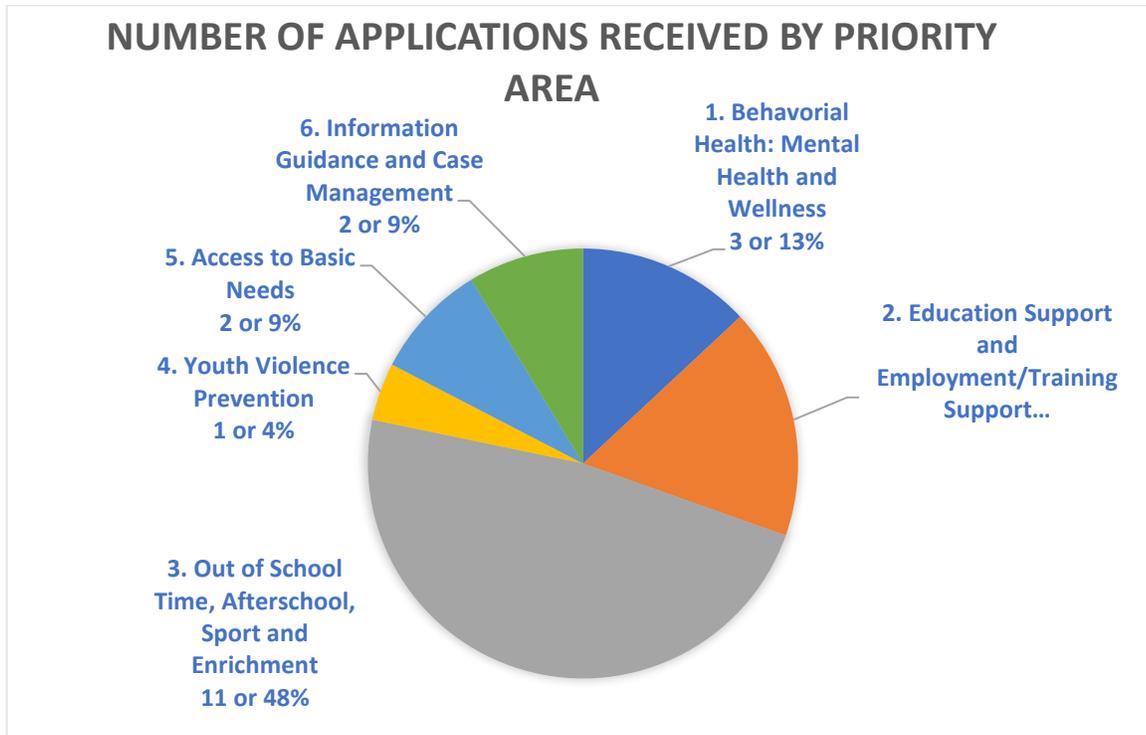
Proposals by Funding Priority Areas

The Strategic Investment Plan (SIP) identified six priority areas for FYs 2021-2024 and assigned a percentage allocation based on the need and potential for equity impact.

PRIORITY AREAS	Estimated % of Total Funds
1. Behavioral Health: Mental Health and Wellness	20% = \$320,000
2. Education Support and Employment/Training Support	20% = \$320,000
3. Out of School Time, After-School, Sports, and Enrichment	20% = \$320,000
4. Youth Violence Prevention	20% = \$320,000
5. Access to Basic Needs	10% = \$170,000
6. Information, Guidance and Case Management	10% = \$170,000
Total Estimated Funding in FY 2022-23	100% = \$1.62M

The majority of the applications fell into both Priority 3: Out of School Time, After-School, Sports, and Enrichment with 11 applications or 48 percent and Priority Area 2: Education Support and Employment/Training Support with 4 applications or 17 percent. The third most received priority area was Priority Area 1: Behavioral Health: Mental Health and Wellness with 3 applications or 13 percent, followed by Priority Areas 5: Access to Basic Needs, and Priority Area 6: Information, Guidance, and Case Management both with 2 application or 9 percent. Priority 4: Youth Violence Prevention came in with only 1 application or 4 percent of the overall number of applications received.

RFP Application Review and Recommendation Flow

To support the review of the proposals, RDCY staff will be implementing the following process approved last year by the Oversight Board.

Threshold Review	Readers/Scorers		Reviewers	Recommendation	Approval

Following Reader/Scorer submissions staff will rank the organizations within each priority area and meet with reviewers to discuss funding recommendations. Staff will subsequently bring back to the Oversight Board, for their final recommendation, those organizations that scored within a minimum percentile or score, demonstrating the strongest capacity to support the various priority areas.

RFCY Grant Review Committee

At its meeting on January 3, 2022, the Oversight Board received and accepted the nominations of four (4) Oversight Board members to serve on the Grant Review Committee. Furthermore, RDCY staff also conducted outreach and recruitment to City of Richmond staff and neighboring municipalities and secured 12 additional review committee members for a total of 16 reviewers overall for FY 2022-23 RFCY Grant applications.

On Friday, March 25, 2022, all 23 grant applications, along with the scoring matrix, were sent electronically (e-mailed) to the review committee with directions and a scoring rubric. RDCY staff also scheduled and hosted a training on Thursday, March 31, 2022, to support reviewers and clarify the roles, duties, and timing for score submission. Ultimately, reviewer scores will be due (submitted) by the final week in April 2022, with review committee funding recommendations coming in early May 2022.

RDCY staff is recommending up to six (6) review sub-committees that may correspond to the six priority areas identified in the RFP and referenced above. Consistent with the Oversight Board's previous direction, the review subcommittees include a mix of:

- RFCY Oversight Board (Board) members
- Non-RDCY City Staff from departments such as the City Manager's Office, Planning, Finance and representatives from the City's Government Alliance on Racial Equity (GARE) team
- Staff from neighboring jurisdictions and Departments of Children and Youth which may include, but are not limited to Oakland, San Pablo, San Francisco, Sacramento, and Alameda County.

Next Steps

RDCY staff will provide an update on the RFP process and will receive recommendations for awards during the Board meeting in May. Also, staff will be recommending the continuation of grant agreements for the FY 2021-22 grantees and may also propose award increases given funding availability.
