Contra Costa Health to Transition its COVID Response

Contra Costa Health (CCH) is transitioning its COVID Response as local, state and federal public health emergencies come to an end.


State testing sites and county-run COVID vaccination sites will close in March 2023. While official health emergencies are going away, we recognize that COVID is not. Contra Costa Health (CCH) will still be addressing COVID as part of its regular departmental operations in the future with a focus on equity.

Here are two key dates:

- **March 4:** Last day of operation for the two remaining [state test-to-treat sites](#) in Pleasant Hill and Antioch. CCH continues to offer [free home test kits](#) to anyone who needs them through CCH's [online form](#) or our call center, 1-833-829-2626. Home test kits are also available free online via the [federal government](#) and at [several locations throughout the community](#), including our health centers and [county-run libraries](#).
- **March 31:** The three [county-run mass vaccination sites](#) in Antioch, Concord and Richmond will close. People can still get vaccines through their regular healthcare providers and local pharmacies. The uninsured and Medi-Cal patients will still be able to access free COVID vaccines at CCH's [health centers](#), [pop-up vaccine clinics](#) and CCH's weekly [immunization-only clinics](#), which will soon be offering evening hours to provide better access to working people.

The state and county-level emergency public health declarations ended on Feb. 28, while the federal emergency declaration ends on May 11.

Contra Costa County Monkeypox Updates

Contra Costa Health Services, along with the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and other agencies, are monitoring a growing outbreak of Monkeypox (MPX) cases in the United States and California. While it is good to stay alert about any emerging public health outbreaks, the current risk of getting MPX in the public is very low, outside of certain activities that increase the chance of exposure.





No person shall be appointed to said Board who holds any salaried public office or employment in the service of the City of Richmond, nor is a retired city employee, nor shall any member, while a member of the board or for a period of one year after he has ceased to be a member of the board, for any reason, be eligible for appointment to any salaried office or employment in the service of the city, or for appointment to any elective office in the City.


The Bay Area Air Quality Management District receives over 12,000 air pollution complaints each year from members of the public. Community members are keenly aware of air pollution events and often provide the first warning of air quality problems.

Examples of complaints include dust or chemical air pollutants emitted by industrial plants, refineries, neighborhood businesses, gas station nozzles, idling trucks, locomotives and buses; and smoke from agricultural fires, controlled burns, non-cooking backyard fires, and outdoor trash burning.

Small Business Administration (SBA) press release: SBA Tops \$25 Million in Disaster Assistance Loans for Severe Winter Storms, Flooding, Landslides and Mudslides

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Director Tanya N. Garfield of the U.S. Small Business Administration’s Disaster Field Operations Center-West announced today that SBA has approved more than \$25.7 million in federal disaster loans for California businesses and residents impacted by severe winter storms, flooding, landslides, and mudslides that occurred Dec. 27, 2022 - Jan. 31, 2023. According to Garfield, SBA has approved \$3,474,600 for businesses and \$22,267,500 for residents to help rebuild and recover from this disaster.

“This financial milestone of approved loans marks the progress of recovery from these storms,” said Francisco Sanchez, Jr., Associate Administrator, Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience. “Long-term recovery is an arduous process, and disaster survivors should know that we will continue to remain vigilant in serving these communities today and into the future to support them as they rebuild.”

“SBA’s disaster assistance employees are committed to helping businesses and residents rebuild as quickly as possible,” said Garfield. Businesses and residents in Alameda, Calaveras, Contra Costa, Mendocino, Merced, Monterey, Sacramento, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz and Ventura counties who sustained damages are encouraged to register prior to the March 16, 2023, deadline with the Federal Emergency Management Agency at www.disasterassistance.gov. “Don’t miss out on any assistance you may be entitled to by not registering for help. You don’t need to wait for your insurance to settle or obtain a contractor’s estimate,” she added.

SBA disaster loan borrowers have up to one year from the date of the note to begin making payments. In addition, interest does not begin to accrue until 12 months from the date of the initial loan disbursement and accrues only on the amount disbursed.

SBA continues to provide one-on-one assistance to disaster loan applicants at all the federal-state Disaster Recovery Centers, SBA Business Recovery Centers, SBA Disaster Loan Outreach Centers, and Local Assistance Centers throughout the affected areas to explain SBA’s disaster loan program and help business owners and residents close their approved disaster loans.

Businesses of all sizes and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. The SBA can also lend additional funds to help business and residents with the cost of making improvements that protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future.

For small businesses and most private nonprofit organizations of all sizes, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the business

suffered any property damage. **The deadline to apply for economic injury is Oct. 16, 2023.**

Disaster loans up to \$200,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property.

Interest rates can be as low as 3.305 percent for businesses, 2.375 percent for private nonprofit organizations and 2.313 percent for homeowners and renters with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition.

Recently, U.S. SBA Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman [announced a policy change](#) granting 12 months of no payments and 0% interest. This pertains to all disaster loans approved in response to disasters declared on or after September 21, 2022, through September 30, 2023. This covers SBA disaster loans currently available for Hurricane Fiona and Hurricane Ian. This policy change will benefit disaster survivors and help them to decrease the overall cost of recovery by reducing the amount of accrued interest they must repay. SBA Supera \$25 Millones en Préstamos por Desastre Aprobados por las Severas Tormentas Invernales, Inundaciones y Deslizamientos de Tierra y Lodo

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Tanya N. Garfield, Directora del Centro de Desastres Regional del Oeste (Disaster Field Operations Center-West) de la Administración Federal de Pequeños Negocios (SBA por sus siglas en inglés), anunció hoy que SBA ha aprobado más de \$25.7 millones en préstamos federales de desastre para los negocios y residentes en el estado de California que se vieron afectados por las severas tormentas invernales, inundaciones y deslizamientos de tierra y lodo que ocurrieron del 27 de Diciembre de 2022 al 31 de Enero de 2023. Según Garfield, SBA ha aprobado \$3,474,600 para negocios y \$22,267,500 a residentes para ayudarlos a reconstruir y recuperarse de este desastre.

No necesita esperar a recibir pago de su seguro o un estimado por parte de un contratista,” agregó.

Los prestatarios de préstamos por desastre de la SBA tienen hasta un año de la fecha del Pagaré para empezar a hacer pagos. Además, los intereses no comienzan a acumularse hasta 12 meses de la fecha del primer desembolso y se acumulan solamente sobre la cantidad desembolsada.







1. Pour cooled fats, oils and grease into a covered, disposable container and throw it into your garbage can. Never pour fats, oils or grease down sink drains or toilets. **COOL IT, CAN IT, TRASH IT.**
2. Soak up remaining oils and grease with an absorbent material such as paper towels, and throw it into your garbage can.
3. Before you wash dishes, scrape food scraps, fats, oils and grease into your garbage can.
4. Use sink strainers to catch any remaining food waste while washing dishes.

The City of Richmond recommends obtaining estimates from at least three (3) contractors.

Eligibility:

- Parcels served by the City of Richmond Sanitary Municipal Sewer District.
- Sewer lateral replacement must be completed before applying for the Sewer Lateral Grant Program.
- A full line replacement must be completed.
- If you have previously received a Sewer Lateral Grant reimbursement, you will not be eligible to apply.

Required Documents:

- Only Lateral Grant Applications dated 6/30/2022 or newer will be accepted.
- Contractor's final paid in full invoice.
- Proof of payment (copy of canceled check, credit card receipt, or bank statement are accepted).
- Certificate of Lateral Compliance (issued by the City after encroachment permit inspections are approved).
- Grant Deed (change of ownership taken place within last 3 months and/or if property is under a Trust).
- Tax-exempt organizations must submit proof of tax-exempt status.

Annual Limits:

- Each fiscal year the City allocates sewer lateral grant funds to be awarded for private sewer lateral replacement.
- This program can be suspended at any time without prior or advanced notification or posting.
- Property owner(s) are eligible for ONE (1) sewer lateral grant reimbursement award in a lifetime on a first come, first served basis until all sewer lateral funds are exhausted.
- Starting July 1, 2022 and ending June 30, 2023, the complete sewer lateral grant reimbursement amount is \$1,800 per application.
- Incomplete applications will NOT be accepted.
- Applications will be accepted via email and mail at this time. This is subject to change.
- No applications will be accepted after the sewer lateral grant funds are exhausted.
- Reimbursement may take approximately 6 weeks from the date the completed application is received and approved by the City.

High Priority Critical Improvements Projects

Location: Wastewater Treatment Plant – 601 Canal Blvd.

Background: The City of Richmond and Veolia Water (Veolia) are implementing High Priority Critical Improvements Projects at the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP), which is managed and operated by Veolia. The purpose of the projects is to replace aging and unreliable infrastructure, improve treatment operating efficiency, comply with future discharge regulations and improve the functionality of the existing

WWTP. The improvements were identified through previous planning efforts, including the 2010 WWTP Master Plan and the 2016 WWTP Facility Plan, to construct the following elements of the WWTP Critical Improvements Projects: (1) New screening and grit removal facilities; (2) Aeration upgrades; and (3) Demolition of existing facilities and site clearing in preparation for future WWTP Facilities. The projects are over 65% complete and are expected to be completed in the fourth quarter of 2023.

Update: During the last two weeks, Shimmick worked in the Aeration Basins on the RAS (return of activated sludge) and air piping systems and the installation of the fine bubble diffuser grid; they also installed instrumentation for air process control. In the Fine Screening Facility, Shimmick's carpenters worked on the construction joints and Shimmick poured the first set of concrete decks. Finally, in the Pista Grit, Shimmick worked on the bottom rebar mat of the structure.



2022-23 Grade 5 RAA Line Replacement

Location: Multiple locations to be provided at a later date


Background: This new project replaces (21) Sewer Main pipeline segments within the City of Richmond and adds Manholes to improve access for future maintenance. The Sewer Mains are 4" - 18" diameter; the combined length of pipe to be replaced is 5,667 lineal feet. These pipes have multiple defects that need to be addressed to avoid future pipe failure, which could lead to sanitary sewer overflows. The City of Richmond advertised this project for bid on Monday, October 17, 2022.

Update: Eleven (11) prospective contractors attended the mandatory Pre-bid Meeting on October 26, 2022. On November 30, 2022, four (4) bids ranging from \$1,319,500 to \$2,543,000 were received; all bids were within the engineer's estimate and budget allotted for this project. D'Arcy & Harty submitted the lowest bid. The project is forecast to start in the second quarter of 2023 pending approval by Richmond City Council.

Ferry Point Sewer Pump Station Replacement Project
Location: Dornan Drive and Brickyard Cove Road

Background: The Richmond Ferry Point Sewer Pump Station is located at Dornan Drive and Brickyard Cove Road. The project has been phased in four phases to allow for construction of the new facilities while keeping the existing pump station operational. During Phase 1, temporary road improvements were installed; Now in Phase 2; the new pump station wet wells, masonry, piping & equipment are being installed. In Phase 3, the new pump station will be placed into service, and Phase 4 will be the removal of the existing pump station and final road improvements. A mandatory pre-bid conference was held January 11, 2022. On January 27, 2022, sealed bids were received from six (6) bidders. The bids were reviewed by Veolia and the City, and the lowest, responsive bid of \$1,948,000.00 was submitted by Thompson Builders Corporation. The project is expected to take approximately one year to complete.

Update: Thompson Builders Corporation mobilized to the site Tuesday January 17, 2023. After temporary traffic control was established, the Contractor excavated and set (3) precast concrete vaults. The Contractor has verified connections for the incoming gravity sewer lines and outgoing sewer force main. Currently crews are installing valves, piping and supports for the (3) new submersible Flygt Pumps in the Precast Wet Well Vault. Excavation for masonry footings will start later in March. Overall project completion is anticipated in the Fourth Quarter 2023.

Marina Bay Parkway Force Main Extension Project

Location: Intersection at Pierson Ave and Marina Bay Parkway

Background: The Marina Bay Parkway Force Main Extension Project extends the existing Marina Bay Parkway force main to a new manhole at the intersection of Pierson Avenue and Marina Bay Parkway and installs a new gravity sewer pipeline from the Pierson/Jetty Drive intersection, across Marina Bay Parkway. This piping reconfiguration will eliminate sanitary sewer overflows that occur from depressed manholes located at the intersection of Marina Bay Parkway and Pierson Avenue. Richmond-based, local contractor W.R. Forde Associates was the lowest, responsive bidder at \$357,200.00.

Update: The project work was initially completed in December 2021. The Contractor returned in March 2022 to install a bolt down manhole frame and cover on the new manhole at the termination of the Force Main. The material for the manhole frame and cover was a long-lead item. Additional scope to alleviate ongoing sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) by adding 991 LF of 8" gravity sewer main and three (3) new manholes with bolt down covers along 27th Street is slated to be on the City Council agenda in the near future.

Sodium Bisulfite (SBS) Facility Improvements Project

Location: Wastewater Treatment Plant – 601 Canal Blvd.

Background: The City of Richmond (COR) and West County Agency (WCA) entered into a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) on July 27, 2020 to share the design and construction costs associated with the new Sodium Bisulfite Facility construction and system upgrade. During the design of the new SBS Facility, WCA and the COR agreed to upgrade the SHS mechanical, electrical, plumbing, instrumentation, and SCADA system, as well. Myers & Sons Construction, LLC is the Contractor. The SBS Facility Improvements Project includes the following major elements:

- New sodium bisulfite and sodium hypochlorite chemical metering and instrumentation systems to replace the existing chemical metering and instrumentation systems.
- Sodium bisulfite and sodium hypochlorite improvements include civil, structural, mechanical, electrical, instrumentation and SCADA system and facility improvements.
- Demolition of existing facilities for project improvements.

Update: Phase I is complete; the new SBS Facility is now in operation. It is anticipated that Phase II will start around April and May 2023, which will consist of the generator installation, as well as improvements made to the chemical induction mixer at the Chlorine Contact Basins and the updated instrumentation work at West County's metering vault.

SCADA Upgrade Project

Location: Wastewater Treatment Plant – 601 Canal Blvd.

The SCADA project (an acronym for Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) will standardize, replace and configure the existing SCADA Network communication, the majority of which is outdated, failing and has exceeded its useful life. An upgraded SCADA system is crucial to allow for Veolia Staff at the City of Richmond's Wastewater Treatment Plant to monitor and control processes locally and at remote locations, including remote telemetry of the City's lift stations.

Update: The Contractor is Calcon Systems, Inc. The project is 100% complete. Two conditions were discovered by Veolia and Calcon towards the end of Calcon's contract, and the City approved a change order to correct (repair) the battery backup power systems to eliminate power failure conditions and repair blower communication faults. These two items do not affect the programming, which is complete. Due to backorder issues with equipment, some of the supplies will not be available until April 2023, so the Contractor's agreement has been extended through the end of June 2023. There are no cost implications to this supply issue.

Trash Capture Project, Bayview (currently in design)

Location: Bayview Ave

Background: In 2017, Caltrans and the City of Richmond collaborated to implement the Trash Capture Project. The Contech Engineered Solutions CDS system is a below-ground, flow-through treatment device that uses multiple treatment processes including swirl concentration and continuous deflective separation (CDS) to screen, separate and trap trash, debris, sediment, hydrocarbons and other pollutants from stormwater runoff. Veolia Water, in conjunction with the City of Richmond, successfully installed four such devices in 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2021; another device is being installed in 2023 on Bayview.

Update: Design has reached 80% completion. The "End of the Pipe" location at the Bayview outfall has been determined to be the most feasible location for the new double chambered CDS units. Coordination with CalTrans and Environmental Studies and permitting are underway. Geotechnical drilling investigation (Miller Pacific); additional soil sampling (Questa) and Environmental field studies were completed in August 2022. Multiple coordination meetings with CalTrans ROW Program Managers and Regional Maintenance Managers have been conducted to address easement, encroachment and Right-Of-Way exceptions and permit coordination.

The most recent Design meeting was held Tuesday January 31, 2022. Updates were provided on Environmental Studies and Permitting; Design; Constructability and Encroachment Permitting Status. Permit applications are being finalized for submission for (3) Environmental Permits. The CalTrans Encroachment Permit application and additional project information package requested by CalTrans has been submitted. The next Design meeting will be scheduled after CalTrans has assigned a Project Manager to coordinate Encroachment, Easements and Right-Of-Way.

13. Unhoused Initiatives and Resources

Castro Encampment Resolution Project

HCEB and the CORE Team continue to work with Castro residents to get them document ready (meaning assisting residents on obtaining a state issued photo I.D., birth certificate, Social Security card or disability verification) and to identify their housing needs and options. The City's Castro Encampment Resolution Project (CERP) Manager Vanessa Calloway continues to identify local housing partners to join the Housing Providers Meeting to share information about the Castro housing program and potentially expand the housing options available for Castro residents. With the Housing Consortium of East Bay's (HCEB) Housing Navigator on-boarded, the landlord partnerships have expanded providing more housing choices for residents.

The office trailer to be used by HCEB and service providers to meet with residents for developing their housing plans has been delivered, set up, and is being checked by an HCEB electrician for connection to power this week. The goal is to have the office trailer ready for use as soon as possible.

Housing Placements

Since March 3, 2023, through today March 9, eight residents have been housed including one minor. From September 2022 through March 7, 2023, 31 residents, which include four minors, have been housed at either a shelter, shared housing, or apartment. CERP Project Manager Vanessa Calloway is working with a nonprofit organization that will be able to provide residents furnishings for their homes at a cost of \$750 per residence. Furniture items will vary based on apartment size and other needs, but mostly likely include beds, tables, chairs, kitchen appliances, and other items. Vanessa has also sourced furniture and food donations from local community members to assist Castro residents. Residents are also being provided gift cards to help them buy food and other personal items they need to start living in their new homes. Community members wishing to donate small household appliances, such as a microwave, vacuum cleaner, countertop oven, toasters, etc., can contact Vanessa Calloway via email at way2love@way2loveinc.org.

This week's accomplishments for the CERP are:

- Eight households were housed in the past week.
- Gift cards were provided to placed households.
- Way 2 Love is also coordinating with several private donors that have reached out to donate housing furnishings and other household items to support placed residents.
- City staff ordered 22 extra-large tarps that are being installed on RVs by SOS ahead of inclement weather.

- Way 2 Love picked up and delivered two large bags of clothing for Castro residents.

Auto/RV Tows

Several RVs were scheduled to be demolished and towed on Thursday March 9, 2023; however, due to the severe rain has been rescheduled for next Thursday. With the placement of the 24/7, on-site security, and the strategic placement of k rails, the backfill of stolen or abandoned vehicles that was occurring has been maintained to nearly zero.

Weekly Meetings Regarding Unhoused Interventions

Weekly Castro Interdepartmental Meeting, Mondays at 9:00-10:00 AM. Jesus Morales, Vanessa Calloway, and representatives from Public Works, Richmond Police Department, Richmond Fire Department, Parks and Recreation, Code Enforcement, City Manager's Office, Community Development, HCEB, Ascend Professional Services, Coordinated Outreach Referral Engagement (CORE), and Safe Organized Spaces (SOS) meet to discuss ongoing activities at the Castro encampment, upcoming events, and plan support for planned activities. Seventeen staff members were in attendance.

Weekly Castro Service Providers Meeting and By Names List, Has been changed from Fridays at 1:00-1:30 PM to Tuesdays from 10:00 AM to 11:30 AM. Jesus Morales, Vanessa Calloway, and representatives from service providers, SOS, CORE, HCEB, and Ascend Professional Services (security) meet to review needs and coordinate supports for residents and encampment.

This meeting now includes the "By Name List" meeting where HCEB, CORE, and CERP Project Manager Vanessa Calloway discuss the ongoing status of individual residents to determine needs and housing plans.

Housing Providers Meeting, Third Friday of the month at 3:00-4:00 PM, Jesus Morales, Vanessa Calloway, and representatives from service providers, SOS, CORE, HCEB, and landlords interested in working with the Castro Encampment Care Team to provide housing on opportunities for Castro residents.

- Next meeting will be March 17, 2023.

Encampment Resolution Fund (ERF) Round 2

City staff working with the City's consultant, HTA, submitted an application for Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF) - Round 2 on Tuesday, February 28, 2023. The city's proposed application will focus on City and Caltrans hot spots. Projects incorporating encampments within State rights-of-way are being prioritized for funding in this round of the ERF. Staff anticipates hearing back regarding the application in April.

Homekey Round 3 Site Development Research

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is expected to release the Round 3 Notice of Funding Availability for the Homekey program in March 2023. Homekey Round 3 continues a statewide effort to sustain and rapidly expand housing for persons experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. Homekey is an opportunity for state, regional, and local public entities to develop a broad range of housing types, including but not limited to hotels, motels, hostels, single-family homes and multifamily apartments, adult residential facilities, and manufactured housing, and to convert commercial properties and other existing buildings to Permanent or Interim Housing for the Target Population.

City staff and community members of the Site Development Team are meeting regularly to provide preparation input on Homekey 3 research in advance of the expected release of the state application in March of 2023. Given past application requirements, it is anticipated that any future sites would likely have a short turnaround time. Focus in the past has been centered on acquisition of hotels and motels that require minimal rehabilitation and can be converted into interim housing.

Housing First Program

The Housing First Program contract, approved by the City Council on December 20, 2022, has been fully executed, and the Richmond Community Foundation (RCF), the program administrator, is gearing up to start assisting Richmond residents via emergency short term housing assistance. The other portion of the program is Housing

First, which is to provide longer term rental assistance to homeless or near homeless residents with priority given to former Rydin Road encampment residents. RCF, in collaboration with local partners, is in the process of hiring a couple of Care Managers that will be the primary points of contact for the Housing First Program.

RCF is moving forward with onboarding its partners, Collaborising and Catholic Charities, to hire and manage the Care Managers. Care Managers will be the direct contacts for interested applicants for the Housing First Program.

Rydin residents are being provided RCF's contact information and RCF will also be provided contact information for former Rydin encampment residents to facilitate communications between both sides.

Homeless Strategic Plan

The city's consultant, Homebase, delivered the draft "City of Richmond Homeless Strategic Plan" for review and comment. The Plan is posted on the city website and is being distributed to various interested parties, city staff, Homeless Task Force members, the Homeless Strategic Plan Steering Committee, and members of focus groups that participated in interviews and public forums. The Plan will be presented at the City Council Study Session on March 28, 2023. Staff looks forward to receiving City Council and public comments on the draft at the study session.

C.O.R.E. Homeless Outreach

The CORE team was dispatched to several locations throughout the city to provide services to the unhoused, including the Richmond Greenway.

The Coordinated Outreach Referral, Engagement (C.O.R.E.) program works to engage and stabilize homeless individuals living outside through consistent outreach to facilitate and/or deliver health and basic need services and secure permanent housing.

C.O.R.E. teams serve as an entry point into Contra Costa's coordinated entry system for unsheltered persons and work to locate, engage, stabilize and house chronically homeless individuals and families. The outreach teams identify individuals living on the streets, assess their housing and service needs, and facilitate connection to shelter and services.

To notify a C.O.R.E. team about an unsheltered homeless individual or family, please call 211. Please note that C.O.R.E. teams are not designed for crisis response. For medical or other emergencies involving homeless individuals, please call 911.

Homeless Taskforce

A subcommittee of the Homeless Taskforce met to learn more about the Youth Spirit Artworks model from the adult and youth founders.

Winter Storm Coordination

There is continued coordination and communication with Contra Costa Health Services H3 services, and local providers around the rains and storms, including seeking a future warming center location in West County that could fully open in the Fall to be better prepared for next winter. Currently, the county and existing service partners have agreed to open additional bed spaces, as needed, to accommodate those who need warm respite from the immediate winter storms.

Contra Costa Resources for People Experiencing Homelessness

A strong storm system and associated atmospheric river will bring widespread moderate to heavy rainfall and strong winds to the region from Thursday through Tuesday. This will increase the threat for widespread flooding and wind damage across the Bay Area & Central Coast. Get the latest weather forecasts at <https://www.weather.gov/mtr/>.
