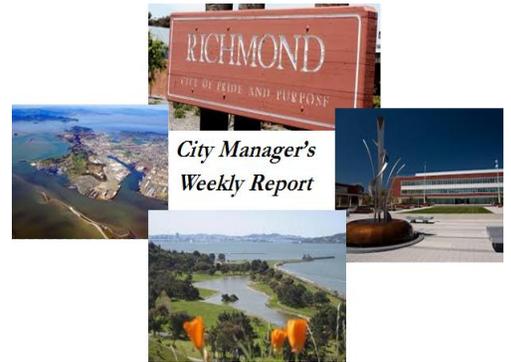




Mayor and Members of the City Council:

This is the weekly report for the week ending January 6, 2017.



1. Meeting Notes

New and incumbent members of the Richmond City Council will be sworn in to office on Tuesday, January 10th. The first regular City Council meeting of the calendar year is scheduled for Tuesday, January 17th.

2. Richmond Rent Program Office Opened on Tuesday, January 3, 2017

This past November, Richmond voters passed Measure L, the “Richmond Fair Rent, Just Cause for Eviction and Homeowner Protection Ordinance,” which became effective on December 30, 2016. The Ordinance establishes a Rent Program in the City of Richmond, directed by a five-member Rent Board.

In advance of a Rent Board being appointed to operate these new rent regulations, and in accordance with this new ordinance, staff members from the City Manager’s office are beginning to implement preliminary elements of the program. As a first step, over the past several weeks, residents began receiving written information about the new rent ordinance and its implementation. The Richmond Rent Program office also opened this past Tuesday, January 3rd to begin assisting tenants and landlords. The office is located on the second floor at 440 Civic Center Plaza, and open Monday through Friday from 9:00 AM 12:00 PM and 1:00 PM - 4:00 PM. TERMS TO KNOW



Rent Control	Establishes maximum annual rent increases for residential housing units. Not all residential properties are subject to rent control.
Just Cause for Eviction	Prohibits landlords from ending a rental agreement without a "just cause." Relocation payments must be made to tenants for certain permitted evictions, such as substantial repairs.
Base Rent	The initial rent on a lease or rental agreement. The starting base rent for rent controlled units is the rent paid in July 21, 2015, or the first month a tenant moved in after that date.
Consumer Price Index (CPI)	A measurement of the average change over time in the prices of goods and services determined by the federal government. Rent may be increased by 100% of the CPI each year.
Maximum Allowable Rent	The most money that can be charged to a tenant each year, including the base rent and properly-noticed CPI adjustments. Landlords and tenants may petition the Rent Board for an upward or downward adjustment of the maximum allowable rent based on changes to the property, conditions, etc.

WHAT'S THE RENT BOARD?



A Rent Board will be established to administer the Richmond Rent Program in accordance with the ordinance. The Rent Board will be composed of five members appointed by the City Council. No more than two Rent Boardmembers may own or manage any rental property or serve as realtors. The Rent Board will have the ability to:

- ▶ Approve rent adjustments
- ▶ Charge and collect fees
- ▶ Mediate disputes

I'm a Renter

Is my home rent controlled?

Multi-unit homes (including duplexes) built before 1995 are rent controlled. Single family homes, certain small second units ("granny units"), and rental of a room within a home are NOT controlled. Please contact us if you think your unit is rent controlled and you are paying more than the maximum rent.

Does my home qualify for Just Cause for Evictions protections?

Yes. All long-term renters qualify for Just Cause for Eviction protections BUT landlords can still terminate a lease if there is a "just cause," including failure to pay rent, breaching the lease, or repairs. Relocation payments may be required in some instances.

What if I moved in after July 21, 2015? What rent should I be paying?

Your base rent is what you paid the first month on your lease. You are responsible for the base rent plus all annual CPI increases, if your landlord gives your proper notice.

What if my landlord is charging me more than the Maximum Allowable Rent?

Contact the Rent Program and submit an official complaint form (available on the website and at the Rent Program offices). Maximum Allowable Rents will only be enforceable after December 30, 2016.

I'm a Landlord

How does this ordinance affect my ability to terminate a tenancy?

Landlords retain the ability to terminate a tenancy for several reasons, including: failing to pay rent, breaching the lease, undertaking substantial repairs, or using the unit as a primary residence. Relocation payments may be required in some instances.

I raised the rent on my property since July 21, 2015, what happens now?

Rents for rent controlled properties must be reset to the price paid on July 21, 2015, or the first payment on the initial lease if your tenant moved in after July 21, 2015. No refunds are required for rent increases before January 1, 2017.

How do I file notices of rent increases and termination of tenancy?

Landlords must submit written notices of any actions to all tenants, and file a copy with the Rent Board. Please visit our website to download forms and notices, or stop by our office for assistance.

How do I register as a landlord? Where can I find the forms?

You must submit a registration form to the Rent Program office at 440 Civic Center Plaza. Registration and all other forms can be found on our website and at the Rent Program office.

4. Holiday Tree Disposal and Recycling Options

Residents have several options to properly dispose of holiday trees. Please read the summary below or access the flyer for more information.

- a) If you've not already used your allocated On-Call Curbside Clean-up(s), call Richmond Sanitary Service (RSS) Customer Service to arrange for no cost curbside pick-up at (510) 262-7100. Unscheduled pickups are subject to a \$16.00 service fee by RSS.
- b) On any of your regular green waste collection days, cut your unflocked, natural tree to fit in your yard waste cart. Trees must be 6 feet or less in diameter and cut to 3 feet in length. Cut off top and remove stand and all decorations. Artificial trees should be put into the trash bin.

With proof of residency (driver's license or CA ID), RSS customers can take Christmas Trees to Golden Bear Transfer (1 Parr Blvd, Richmond Monday - Friday, 7:00 AM -5:00 PM; Saturday - Sunday, 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM) through the first weekend in February at no cost for compostable trees; \$8.50 disposal fee for non-compostable tree, or no proof of residency.



5. Richmond's Minimum Wage Ordinance Became Effective January 1, 2017

The increase in the City of Richmond's minimum wage went into effect on January 1, 2017. Effective on that date, the minimum wage as set forth in Richmond's Minimum Wage Ordinance (RMC 7.108) is \$12.30/hour (compared to \$10.50/hour for the State of California effective 2017, and increasing from \$11.52/hour which went into effect in Richmond on January 1, 2016). The Minimum Wage Ordinance applies to any employee who works two or more hours per week.

To advise the business community of this change, the Employment and Training staff posted notices announcing the increase on KCRT and the City's website. Packets were mailed to over 1,000 businesses and to the Richmond Chamber of Commerce members to inform them of the change. The information packet includes versions of the official notice in various languages that must be posted in all

workplaces along with a list of employer and employee rights under the Ordinance. Employers who pay for less than 800 hours of employee labor in a given two week period need not pay the City's minimum wage until they pay over 800 hours or more of employee labor in a two week period. This is the second of three annual increases that will max out at \$13.00/hour on January 1, 2018.

6. Sign-Up Event: Free Home Solar Systems Now Available for Qualifying Richmond Residents!

Richmond homeowners can now qualify for a FREE home solar system funded by the City of Richmond and State of California. To be eligible, Richmond and North Richmond residents must live in their own home, and make less than 80% of area median income (income limits are included in the flyer below and at www.richmondenvironment.org).

The City's partnership with GRID Alternatives has serviced over 190 homes in Richmond and provided millions of dollars in energy cost savings to the community. This new initiative will provide free solar to an additional 100 Richmond households, create more than \$2.5 million in energy cost savings for local families, and prevent more than 5,700 tons of greenhouse gases over the systems' lifetimes. Qualifying homeowners are encouraged to attend the City of Richmond and GRID Alternatives' sign-up event on Wednesday, January 25th, from 6:00 PM to 7:30 PM in the Richmond Council Chambers at 440 Civic Center Plaza. 


9. Community Services Department Department Holiday Food Drive

10. Drug Disposal Law Passed by Contra Costa County

Drug makers will be required to establish drop-off centers to accept unwanted or expired medications, under an ordinance recently passed by the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors. The bill requires drug makers to pay the full cost of establishing and operating a network of centers to take unwanted or unused pharmaceuticals. The goal is to have at least three drop-off sites in each of the five supervisorial districts in the county.



County staff members said the program will protect creeks and bays against contamination by illegal dumping of drugs into the environment, and reduce the risk of people overdosing on prescription drugs. The City of Richmond's Department of Water Resource recovery and six other wastewater agencies in Contra Costa County supported the ordinance.

Richmond residents may dispose of expired and unneeded medications at the take-back bin located in the lobby of the Richmond Police Department. We will provide more details on additional disposal centers when the County provides the information.
