



1. Meeting Notes

2. Ribbon is Cut for Mathieu Court Alley Play Street

This morning, I had the pleasure of attending the ribbon cutting ceremony for the Mathieu Court Alley Play Street. The project was funded in part by a KaBoom! Play Everywhere Challenge grant. KaBoom! is a national non-profit organization that is dedicated to bringing balanced and active play into the daily lives of all kids, particularly those growing up in poverty in America. They have been a partner on several projects in Richmond, most recently the one-day community rebuild of Wendell Park.

Kaboom! acknowledges that, “Play does not always have to happen on a playground. While playgrounds provide joyful oases for play, sometimes play must be available in other places.” Their “play everywhere” initiative,

“...encourages people to think about spaces that could become PLAYces: whether it’s a laundromat, grocery store, sidewalk, bus stop, or somewhere else, these often-boring situations can turn into stimulating, creative outlets for play.”

A new “PLAYce” has now sprung up at Mathieu Court in Richmond, what was, just a short time ago, an unmaintained alley that was a magnet for illegal dumping. The project was a collaboration among the City of Richmond, Richmond Art Center, The Trust for Public Land, Pogo Park, and the Iron Triangle Neighborhood Council. The City’s project manager was the very talented Lina Velasco. 4. FY2017-18 Operating and Capital Improvement Budget Update

This past week, staff presented to the City Council an overview of the draft fiscal year 2017-18 operating and capital improvement budgets for Housing Programs, Capital Improvement Projects, and the Environmental and Community Investment Agreement (ECIA). Staff also provided an in-depth review of General Fund revenue and expenditures, and adjustments made to reduce the prior operating budget gap

from \$866,000 to \$30,000. The Council is scheduled to consider adoption of the budget at its meeting of June 20th.

6. We Need Your Input on the City's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan

The City of Richmond is updating its Local Hazard Mitigation Plan in partnership with Contra Costa County. The Local Hazard Mitigation Plan serves as a coordinating document for the City and approximately three dozen local agencies and special purpose districts to reduce their risks from a wide range of potential natural and non-natural hazards, including earthquakes, floods, wildfires, and extreme heat.

The current plan was developed in 2011 and approved in April of 2012; it is expected that the update process will take approximately six months. Thank you for your time and contribution to this effort!

7. City Manager Chronicles

I have listed below some of the topics for meetings that I attended during the past week in the hope that it provides an idea of the varied issues with which our organization deals routinely.

Meetings of note this past week included:

- Attended the Saturday closed session meeting of the Rent Board to interview candidates for the Rent Board Executive Director position;
- Attended several meetings with the finance team for the planned issuance of wastewater capital improvement bonds, together with Finance Director Belinda Warner, Wastewater Manager Ryan Smith, and members of their respective staffs;
- Met, along with Councilmember Eduardo Martinez and Community Services Director Rochelle Monk, with Berkeley Mayor Jesse Arreguin, Berkeley City Manager Dee Williams-Ridley, and members of their respective staffs, to discuss fair share allocation of costs for capital improvements at the Gilman Soccer Fields;
- Met, together with Housing Authority consultant Tia Ingram, with Richmond Housing Authority (RHA) staff to discuss the status of RHA operations;
- Attended Mayor Tom Butt’s Business Roundtable meeting;
- Met with representatives of the John Stewart Company, together with Housing Authority consultant Tia Ingram, and (temporary) Rent Control staff members Paige Roosa and Gabino Arredondo, to discuss the status of RAD (Rental Assistance Demonstration) conversions at Triangle Court and Friendship Manor;
- Attended the monthly meeting of Contra Costa city managers;
- Attended the quarterly NURVE (Nystrom United Revitalization Effort) Policy Committee meeting with community partners;
- Met with representatives from Mercy Housing, together with Housing Authority consultant Tia Ingram and Management Analyst Mike Uberti, to discuss the Hacienda renovation project;
- Attended the ribbon cutting ceremony for the Mathieu Court Alley Play Street (see item [2] above);
- Toured projects funded by the Love Your Block Mini-Grant program, along with Community Services Director Rochelle Monk, Mayor’s staff member Sequoia Erasmus, and members of the Love Your Block Team (Stephanie Ny, Nadia Perez, and Erika Ito).

These meetings were in addition to attending the regular management staff meeting, agenda planning, reviewing staff reports to the City Council, doing department head “check-ins,” having discussions on various personnel matters, and having short discussions with staff, community members, members of the press, etc.







15. Engineering/CIP Departments

Engineering Projects

The Greenway/Ohlone Gap Closure project is continuing with the pouring of the concrete for the foundation of the pedestrian bridge. The lowering and installation of

the electrical line for the future crosswalk was completed. There was also additional demolition completed.

Streets Division

Paving crews ground and paved 34th Street from Roosevelt Avenue to Garvin Avenue and worked from the outstanding pothole list in various locations around the City.

Street sweeping staff performed commercial and residential sweeping services for the first Monday through Wednesday and the second Thursday and Friday in the Parchester Village, Hilltop Bayview, Hilltop Green, Fairmede/Hilltop, Carriage Hills North Side, El Sobrante Hills, Greenbriar, Hansford Heights, Via Verdi, San Pablo Dam Road, Bristle Cone, Clinton Hill IV, and East Richmond neighborhood council areas.

16. Infrastructure Maintenance and Operations

Crews performed weed abatement in various locations, abated alleyways and lots, and continued removing illegal dumping and graffiti throughout the City.

Carpenters addressed safety issues at the Transit Village, built a new agility testing wall for the Police Department, and installed new bicycle racks near the Main Library entrance.

Painters continued with the painting of the exterior of the Senior Annex Community Center and painted the apparatus door panels at Fire Stations 64 and 67.

Utility workers cleaned the exterior of entry doors at the Native American Health Center, cleaned the carpet at the Port, set up multiple facilities for various events and serviced 29 City owned buildings.

Stationary Engineers repaired a water leak in the heating system to the third floor of City Hall, replaced broken tiles of the outdoor pool of the Richmond Swim Center, and cleared the sewer lines at the Lucretia Edwards and Barbara J. Vincent Park restrooms.

Electricians installed security lighting in the patio area of the Main Library, replaced old lighting at the Recreation Complex, fixed lighting at the Dispatch Center, and reprogrammed 10 traffic control locations along San Pablo Avenue, Richmond Parkway, and Hilltop Drive.
